"Safe, habitable, affordable housing is a human right," **said Eric Tars, National Homelessness Law Center legal director.** "That means that when we call on Congress to act quickly on the Lead-Safe Housing for Kids Act, we are not asking for charity, but rather demanding the government do its duty to its people to ensure safe housing is available to all. Lead paint was banned more than 40 years ago – it is inexcusable that remediation efforts have not reached everyone, and it is even more inexcusable that this public health crisis continues to disparately impact Black and Brown communities. [We demand] that Congress pass the Lead-Safe Housing for Kids Act today, and not stop until the human rights of all our citizens are respected, protected, and fulfilled."
